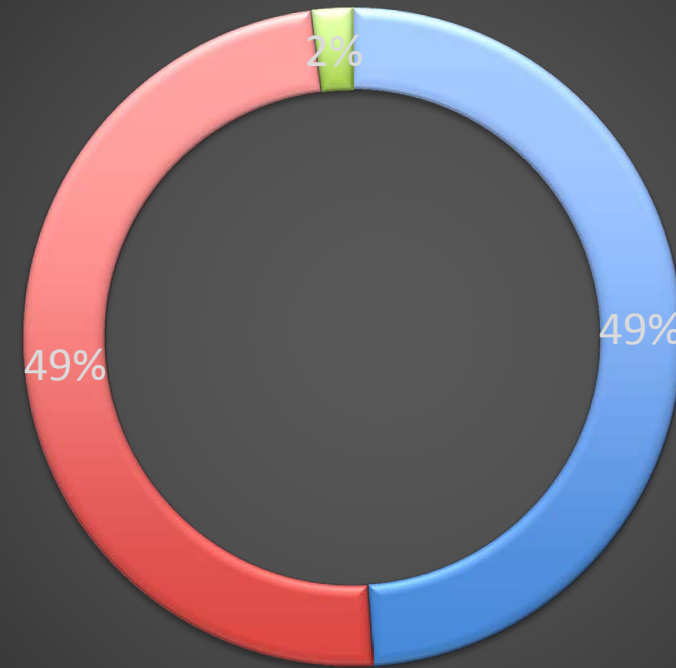

Quantitative Research

- Surveys were undertaken with 6998 women across the three countries
 - 2002 in Ghana - stable
 - 3000 in Pakistan - fragile
 - 1996 in South Sudan – conflict affected
- Gather information about types (physical, sexual, psychological and economic) and forms (partner, family, in the workplace, educational institute and in public spaces)
- Clear difference in overall prevalence between countries.

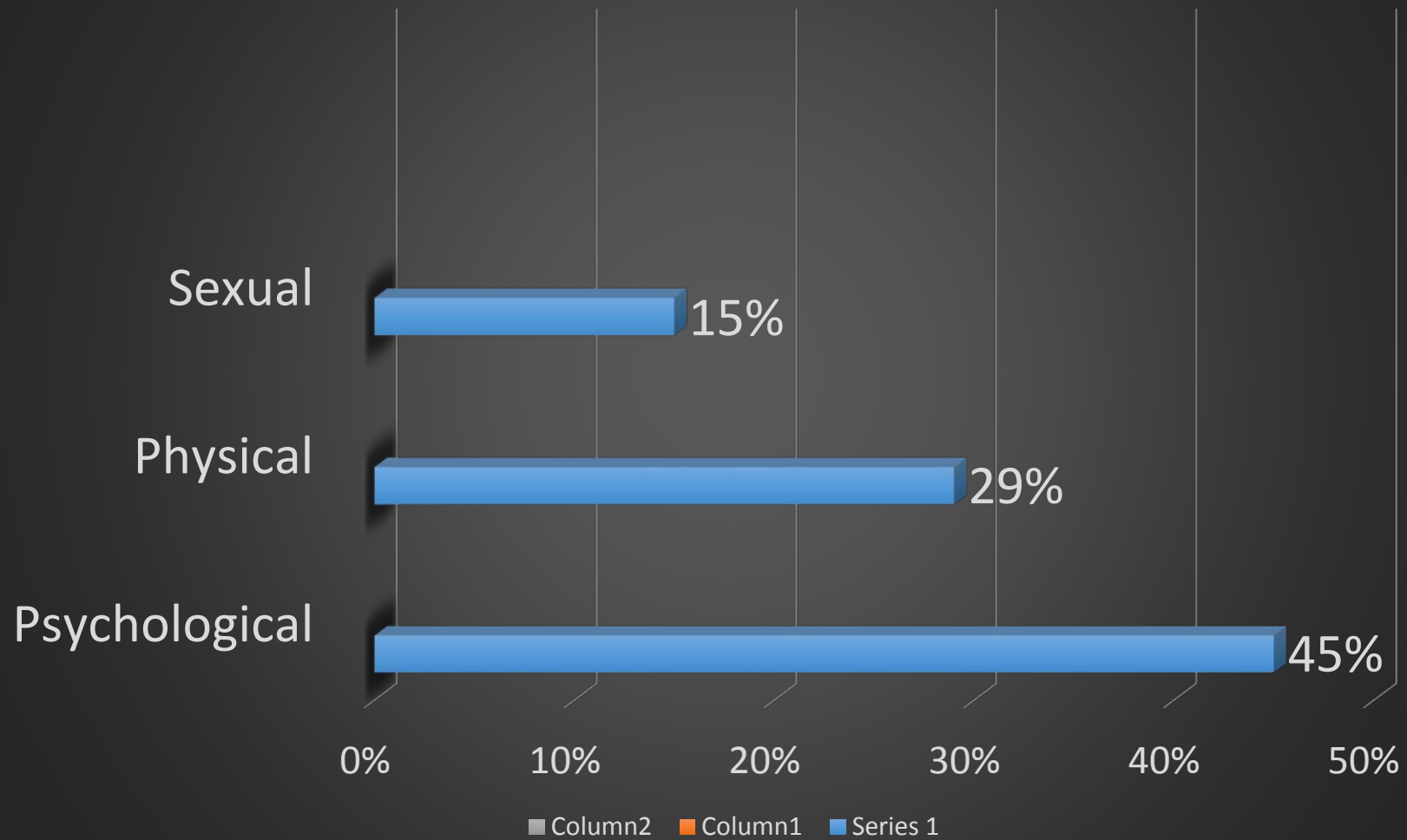
Experience of violence in past 12 months



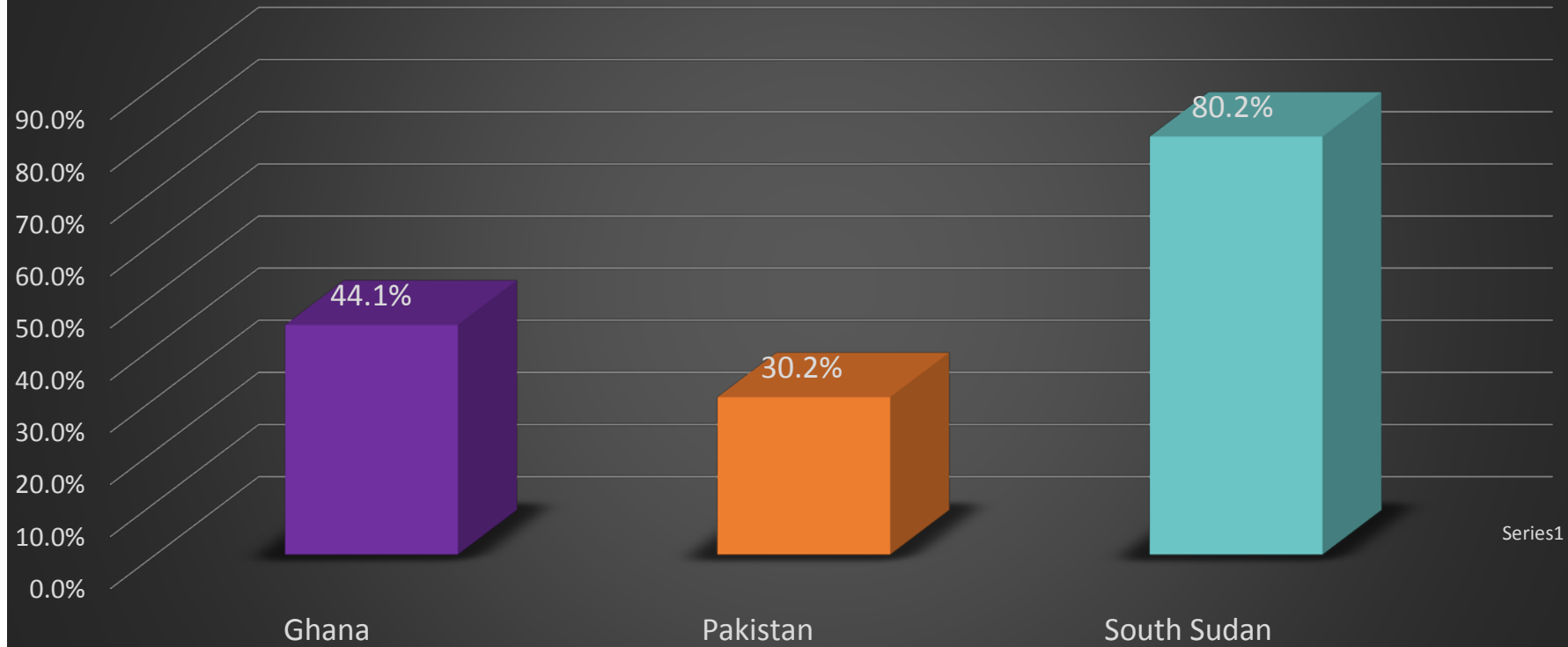
■ Violence ■ No Violence ■ Refused to answer

Forms of Violence



The **home** was the most likely place that a woman would encounter violence by either a partner and/or other family member in Ghana and Pakistan



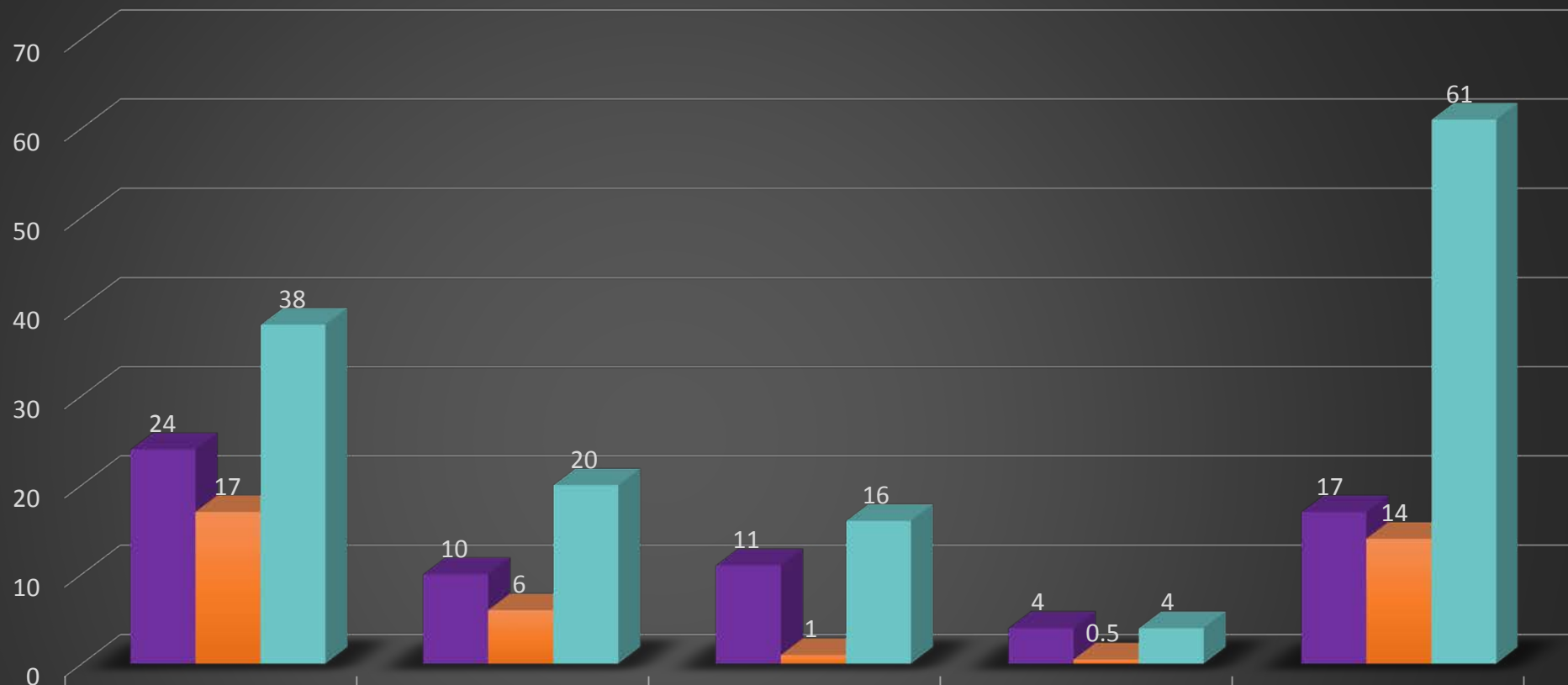
In South Sudan, violence in **public space** slightly more common than violence in the home.



Much lower overall prevalence for **workplace** violence and violence in **educational institutes**, but outcome of smaller sample – high rates among valid sample.

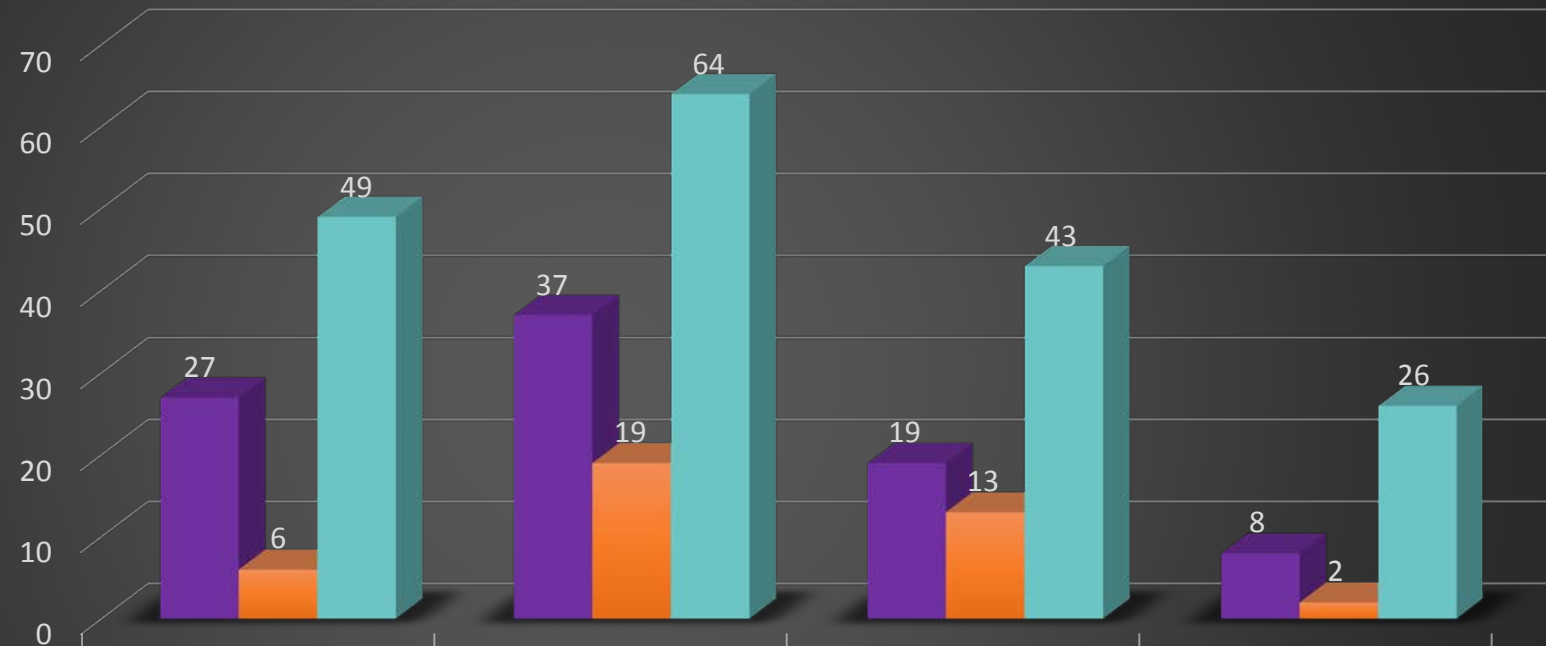


Economic and Social Costs

■ South Sudan, n=1145

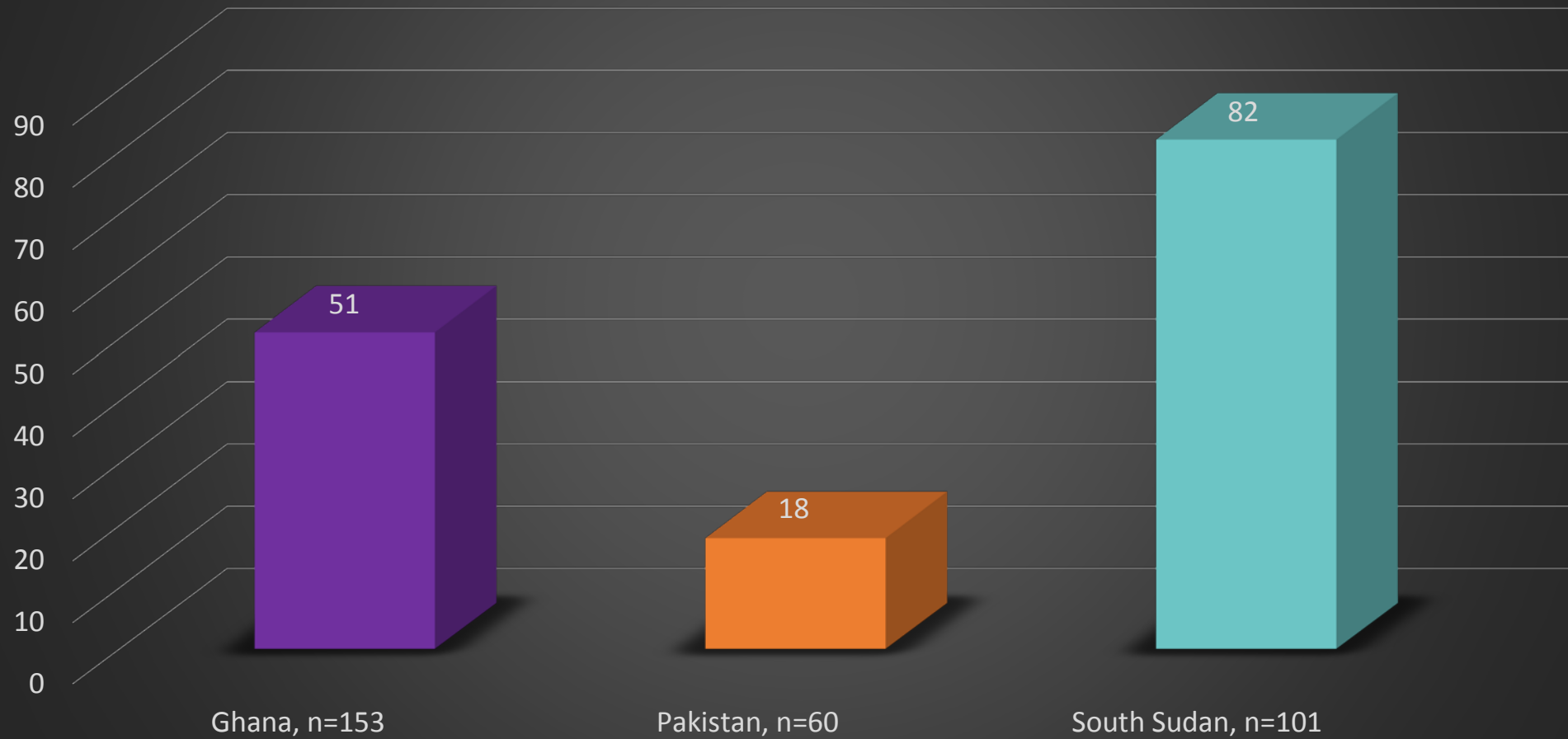

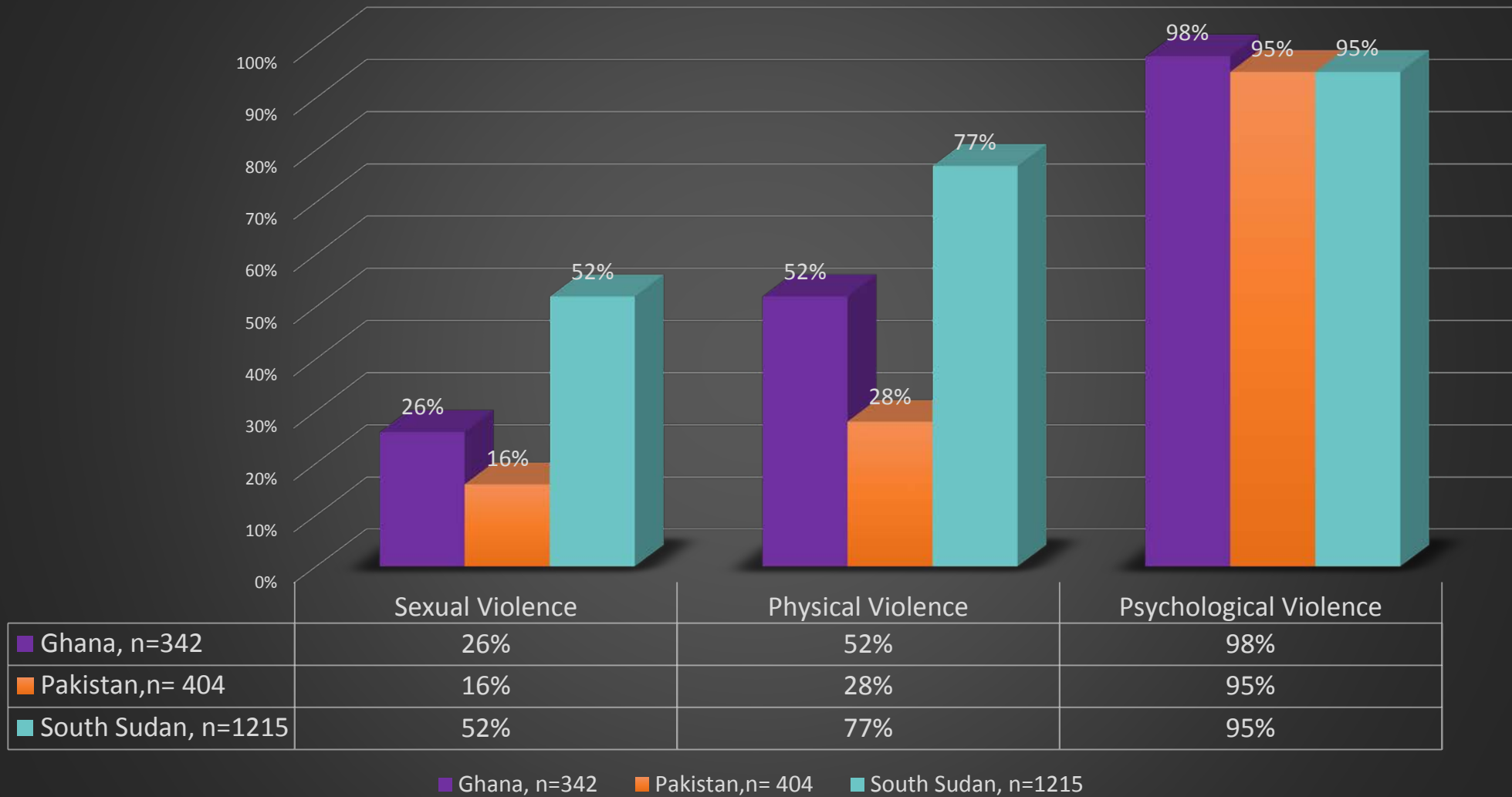

Some early takeaways...

- The patterns of violence are similar across all sites – the home remains a dangerous place for a woman.
 - In Pakistan and Ghana, most dangerous location, in South Sudan elevated levels of violence in public spaces (almost equal % of violence as in home)
- In the conflict affected context, while pattern didn't change, all forms of violence were elevated.
- Although fewer women in education and work, high risks for those that are – across conflict, fragile and stable contexts.
- Pakistan continuously demonstrated lowest prevalence, but requires more probing
